The tablets will enable the Foster Grandparents to connect virtually to the youth they are assigned to and promote social and emotional support.

Many county BOE's lifted their restrictions on volunteers in the classrooms and Foster Grandparents returned to some normalcy on March 1st. FGP staff are hopeful that 90% of the Foster Grandparents will be back in the classroom on April 1st.

Community Development Updates

The MOVRC is seeking public input for the upcoming Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS). The CEDS is a strategy-driven 5-year plan for regional economic development, designed to build capacity and guide economic prosperity and resiliency. A key part of the CEDS process is feedback from the public on the region's economic strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, threats, and resiliency. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has allocated \$1,525,000 to the city of Paden City through the section 219 environmental infrastructure program for a wastewater system improvement project. The proposed project will consist of both plant and line upgrades. The plant upgrades, costing an estimated \$1,529,000, include adding a belt press, HVAC, plumbing, and blower and air diffuser upgrades. The line improvements, expected to cost around \$470,000, include enhancing and repairing existing lines while maintaining and preserving their longevity. The Community Development Program will be working closely with the city of Paden City to complete this proposed project.
