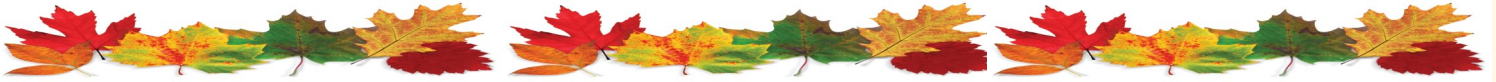

Workforce Development Board

September has been a busy month for the Workforce Development Board. We are continuing to make improvements to our Youth program, now called Career Connections. One of our Youth participants, Bobbi Lewis, was recognized in the paper for completing the Step Up for Women Advanced Manufacturing Pre-Apprenticeship Program. The WDBMOV is also working towards revamping and creating a long lasting, effective adult mentoring program for our Out of School Youth participants. We have also had success stories for our On the Job Training program. Mr. Thomas Ady had attended the Armacell LLC job fair, and although they said he had the experience necessary, he didn't meet requirements of Armacell's policy. With the help of the Adult/Dislocated Worker Case Specialists, Thomas obtained his high school equivalency and is now employed at Armacell LLC through the WIOA OJT Program. We also had our Professional Development Retreat at Cedar Lakes in Ripley earlier this month, with presentations over the MACC system with Workforce WV.

Community Development News



The Calhoun County Park hopes to expand STEM programming and build astronomy lessons at the park into Calhoun County science curriculum in part through a grant from the Foundation for Rural Service. The FRS is a subsidiary of The Rural Broadband Association and SHENTEL was kind enough to act as the required corporate sponsor for this project. Jeff Bary, a McDowell County native and current Professor of Astronomy and Physics at Colgate University will travel with his students to train Calhoun County teachers and students on how to measure darkness and GPS test points on a map. The results will be used to qualify Calhoun County park for certification as an International Dark Sky location. The grant also includes funds for a new student accessible telescope in the \$3,840 request. The grant announcement will be in December 2018.

DID YOU KNOW??????????

The gorgeous red, orange and yellow pigments found in fall foliage are actually there all year, just under the surface. Sunlight helps fuel plant cells containing a chemical called chlorophyll, which gives leaves its vivid green color while working to turn light into energy. When sunlight diminishes in fall, chlorophyll breaks down, letting plant's hidden red, yellow, and orange hues shine.
